CIFEJ is more than just an organization—it is a movement for change. With your continued support, we can create lasting impact and a future shaped by empathy, inclusion, and hope.



Our recent animation-based education program engaged over 50,000 children and 1,000 educators—proof of the impact structured, inclusive media literacy can have. With CIFEJ's expertise, we aim to scale this model internationally. In an era of rapid digital transformation, our focus is not fear but embracing innovation. From storytelling and character design to immersive educational experiences, we view AI and emerging technologies as powerful creative allies—when employed ethically and inclusively.

Let this newsletter serve not only as an update—but as a call to action. We invite all members of the CIFEJ family to collaborate, share, and shape together a more connected, creative, and youth-centered future for children's media.



1st International CIFEJ Symposium

Athens, 2025

I. The 1st International CIFEJ Symposium successfully held in Athens: A new era for children's and youth cinema begins

The 1st International Symposium of the International Centre of Films for Children and Young People (CIFEJ) was successfully held on Monday, May 5, 2025, in a large auditorium at the European Parliament Office in Athens. The event was co-organized by CIFEJ and the Hellenic Film and Audiovisual Center - EKKOMED.

Under the title "Storytelling through Kids & Media: Audience development across regional, national and cultural borders for future generations", the event marked the official launch of CIFEJ's new headquarters in Athens, after 14 years of presence in Tehran, and initiated a new chapter of international cooperation in the field of children's and youth audiovisual content.

The event hosted globally recognized guests from Europe, the USA, Canada, India, Iran, South Africa, and other countries. Representatives of UNESCO, the European Children's Film Association (ECFA), as well as members of the CIFEJ Board of Directors, were also present. The purpose of the event has been to bring together key stakeholders and lead practitioners promoting children's and youth film on the global stage, by showcasing their extensive and critical work in the field.





The Symposium was structured around two Round Table discussions.

The first Round Table, coordinated by Irene Andriopoulou, touched on the topic of Why Greece? Why now? exploring the momentum of bringing CIFEJ to Greece and Europe, after 14 years of operation in Tehran, Iran.

This marked a new era, where commitment to boosting and expanding quality media production, promoting and developing film education and professional training in Children's and Youth Cinema, are renewed under an innovative and extrovert prism. Greece is now the host country of CIFEJ with its new HQ in Athens coordinated by the Hellenic Film and Audiovisual Center - EKKOMED, signaling a big step into children and youth film production for the first time the Mediterranean region and back to Europe, after its launch by UNESCO in 1955 in Edinburgh. It is indeed noteworthy to revisit the first aims and scopes of CIFEJ being the promotion and empowerment of youth through "screen education", in response to heavy film propaganda in the post-war society, back in the day.

The decision for moving CIFEJ to Greece was the outcome of long - term negotiations of the between the Hellenic Ministry of Culture and the Minister herself, Dr. Lina Mendoni, the persistence of our founding member of CIFEJ, grandma Athina Rikaki, the vision of Leonidas Christopoulos, CEO of the Hellenic Film and Audiovisual Center as host organization, and CIFEJ's previous Board and KANOON organization in Iran.



There could not have been a better timing for this since a new era for Greece's engagement in the CCIs is launched, due to the new Law 5153/2024, that established H.F.A.C. - EKKOMED, as the new uber actor in the CCIs for Greece and global stakeholder. In this context, Greece stands in the crossroads between Europe and the rest of the world in promoting a coherent national policy for the fields of audiovisual, film and culture, as well as in the CCIs to highlight a modern cultural identity, notably through the use of new technologies and innovative media.

The panel elaborated on the perspectives, challenges and potentials from the new Athens HQ that coincided with the re-branding of CIFEJ as global key actor in the field, staying close to the original premise that was the definition of a clearing house with focus on the cultural and educational needs of young people, on the one hand, and on the requirements of professional groups and the CCIs industry, on the other.




The **second Round Table**, coordinated by **Katerina Virvidaki**, focused on **Future Challenges and Prospects for Quality Content in Children's Media**, where participants explored the need to rethink the ways through which, educational practices as well as the film and media industries at large, engage young audiences with meaningful, imaginative, and socially relevant storytelling.

A recurring theme referred to the need to combine creativity and criticality—an approach that not only inspires children through captivating, fun narratives, but also encourages them to reflect on the world around them.

Best practices for engaging children and youth with quality film content could also prioritize the value of authenticity, ensuring that stories genuinely reflect the lived experiences of young viewers. Importantly, when it comes to empowering children to create their own films, the emphasis should be placed on the process itself (rather than focusing solely on the final product), thus allowing children to cultivate a deeper and more personal connection to media, as a form of communication and cultural participation.

A discussion around the values which come into play when considering the ethical and cultural responsibilities of Festival programming and curation, finally underscored the conversation.



1st International CIFEJ Symposium

Athens, 2025

Ultimately, the successful hosting of the 1st International CIFEJ Symposium in Athens signaled a crucial moment for the future of children's and youth cinema on a global scale. With its new base in Greece, CIFEJ enters a dynamic phase of creative renewal, policy alignment, and international collaboration. The thought-provoking discussions and diverse global participation reaffirmed the importance of fostering media literacy, cultural authenticity, and storytelling that genuinely resonates with young audiences. As the organization moves forward, it strives to become a central force in shaping inclusive, educational, and imaginative content for new generations.

The **Minister of Culture of Greece, Dr. Lina Mendoni,** in her remote greeting, described the symposium as "a landmark and highly promising beginning," emphasizing the significance of CIFEJ's relocation to Greece. The Minister referred to cinema as a powerful tool for shaping social consciousness, especially among younger generations, and acknowledged Greece's contribution to the global cultural scene. She expressed warm thanks to all involved, and to **Athina Rikaki**, honorary president of CIFEJ, for her decisive role in making this vision a reality.

The **CEO** of **EKKOMED**, **Leonidas Christopoulos**, emphasized the importance of this new, hopeful chapter for CIFEJ in Athens, especially in today's turbulent international context. He noted that the relocation was the result of collective effort and reaffirmed EKKOMED's commitment to acting as a reliable partner in advancing innovative policies and content in the field of children's and youth cinema.

Mr. Vassilis C. Karamitsanis, Secretary General of CIFEJ and President of ANIMASYROS, described the event as a historic moment for children's and youth cinema in Greece. He further highlighted that the efforts of Minister Lina Mendoni and Athina Rikaki to promote the strategic positioning of children's audiovisual content are now becoming a tangible reality, thanks to the united forces of CIFEJ and EKKOMED – Creative Greece.

As the national host organization, **EKKOMED** and **CIFEJ**, through the trust it has placed in the Greek film community, are jointly opening a new channel of dialogue, exchange, and collaboration.

The event was held with the support of the **Ministry of Culture** and the **European Parliament Office** in Greece.

Report on Cannes, Kristiansand and GIFFONI Film Festivals

A significant milestone during the Cannes visit was Mishra's representation of CIFEJ at the Roundtable for International Film Festivals & Markets, held at the Bharat Pavilion on May 14. This high-level engagement provided a critical opportunity for dialogue and knowledge exchange among global film institutions. Over the ten days, CIFEJ held 30+ one-on-one meetings, participated in 10+ forums and conferences, and reached over 10,000 people across social media platforms such as Instagram and Facebook, presenting substantial growth in online engagement and visibility. Mr. Mishra also participated in collaborative discussions with representatives at the Greek Pavilion, exploring joint initiatives and future projects, aimed at empowering young filmmakers and promoting children's cinema worldwide.

Apart from Cannes, Mishra also participated in the **Kristiansand International Children's Film Festival in Norway (May 7–10)** and the **55th GIFFONI Film Festival in Italy (July 17-23)** where he explored new avenues for cooperation, exchange, and creative development. Both events, known for their focus on young audiences, aligned with CIFEJ's mission and allowed Mr. Mishra to further cement the organization's commitment to building a diverse and rich ecosystem for children's media and storytelling.

Together, these international participations underscored CIFEJ's growing outreach, expanding the organization's footprint across the world and laying the groundwork for international partnerships for the future.

CIFEJ REPORT

The Transfer of CIFEJ HQ from Tehran to Athens, and the New Board of CIFEJ

Following the proposal presented by CIFEJ Honorary President, Athina Rikaki, to the Board of Directors in mid-2024, the members of the Board, after several meetings of careful consideration, and in accordance with the Statutes of the organization, decided to move the Headquarters of CIFEJ from Tehran, Iran to Athens, Greece.

The organization hosting the new HQ, would be the Hellenic Film & Audiovisual Center – EKKOMED.

In alignment with CIFEJ's global mission to foster intercultural dialogue and support inclusive storytelling for young audiences, the decision to transfer the HQ, reflects CIFEJ's ongoing commitment to cultural diversity and operational adaptability, positioning the organization within a historically rich and internationally connected city that underscores the organization's dedication to global partnerships in children's media.

The decision was communicated to the members of CIFEJ at the extraordinary meeting of the General Assembly held on September 13, 2024.

The elections of the new Board of Directors, postponed until the HQ transfer was complete, were finally held online, through the ElectionBuddy platform, on March 23, 2025.

After the new Board was convened, the latter appointed Mr. Vassilis Karamitsanis as CIFEJ Secretary General and Ms. Irene Andriopoulou as CIFEJ Executive Director.



Synopsis

The Replacement is a stop motion animated short depicting life in an old oil mill. When the mill's camel becomes ill and unable to turn the millstone, the miller installs a mechanical engine as its substitute. As the machine takes over the work, the sidelined camel reacts with jealousy—highlighting the tension between tradition and technology. Using rich stopmotion puppetry, the film evocatively examines how replacing natural, living labor with machinery affects relationships, emotions, and the soul of rural life.

About the Director

Abdollah Alimorad (b. November 22, 1947, Tehran) is a renowned Iranian animator, director, and screenwriter. A graduate of the Kanoon School of Animation, he has created numerous stopmotion films for children. His acclaimed works include Bahador (2001), which won the Grand Prix at Cannes Junior, and The Replacement (2022), which received the CIFEJ Prize at the Tehran International Animation Festival. Alimorad's films have garnered international recognition, with awards from festivals in Berlin, Cairo, and Russia.

Along the way, she teams up with two misfit companions: Bronco, a bold boy steeped in Māori tradition, and Mallory, a quiet newcomer grieving his mother. Set against the stunning backdrop of Aotearoa, the film beautifully explores themes of cultural identity, healing through nature, and the transformative power of connection.

A Toi Whakaari graduate, she made her feature-directing debut with The Mountain (2024), and is known for roles in Whale Rider, Boy, Moana, Hunt for the Wilderpeople, and Heartbreak High.

Synopsis

Icarus and the Minotaur is an animated mythological adventure / drama film which tells the story of young Icarus who apprentices in his father Daedalus' sculpture workshop on Crete, and secretly befriends a gentle boy with a bull's head—Asterion, the Minotaur—hidden in King Minos's palace. Their bond is shattered when Minos imprisons Asterion deep in the labyrinth Daedalus built, and Icarus' trust in his father crumbles. When Prince Theseus arrives to slay the creature, Icarus makes a desperate attempt to save his friend. But a night of betrayal and tragedy forces him into a heartbreaking choice between light and darkness.

About the Director

Carlo Vogele is a Luxembourg-born animator and filmmaker trained at Gobelins and CalArts. He directed award-winning stop-motion shorts—For Sock's Sake, Una Furtiva Lagrima, Wurst—before his feature debut, Icare (Icarus and the Minotaur) in 2022.
